U.U.P. CHIEF URGES NEW U.K. EIRE AGREEMENT

Ulster Proclaims Its Loyalty in Twelfth Rallies

A wider British-Irish Agreement was advocated by R.W. Bro. Rt. Hon. James H. Molyneaux, M.P., when he delivered the main address at the Twelfth demonstration in Lisburn.

Such an accord, he said, must have been in the minds of Mrs. Thatcher and the Taoiseach, Mr. Haughey, when they coined the phase "the totality of relationships within these islands."

"FIRMER GROUND"

Bro. Molyneaux added: "There need be no loss of face in seeking that firmer ground on which to build an enduring structure to accommodate all reasonable people within the British Isles."

The Anglo-Irish Agreement created a version of "the eternal triangle, in which there is precious little affection," added the Ulster Unionist

Each of the three elements is at variance with the other two. A regime imposed by political brutality could hardly win many hearts in Ulster, nor was it designed to."

Bro. Molyneaux said people in Great Britain could not understand why the Agreement had failed to halt the "barrage of anti-British abuse from Irish republicans the world over."

He added: "They ask what went wrong with the crafty Whitehall scheme to trap Dublin governments into complaining in private, but not on the world stage."

He pointed out that Fine Gael, aware that nationalists in Northern Ireland were "dwarfed" by at least double that number in England, had forecast that a further 500,000 Irish immigrants would move to England in the coming generation.

"POLITE" SMEAR

Their Foreign Affairs spokesman, Mr. Peter Barry, had called for a government department to deal with emigrant matters, saying that

in London "a significant number of them encounter accommodation and employment problems."

That was a polite way of alleging discrimination, added

"If the Irish in London 'perceive' that they are victims of discrimination, the Anglo-Irish Agreement cannot redress their griev-

For this and many other reasons a new, wider British-Irish Agreement was needed, he declared.

TALKS WITH SINN FEIN CONDEMNED

Belfast Co. Grand Orange Lodge Grand Master, R.W. Bro. John McCrea, J.P., said at Edenderry that the SDLP are deliberately spoiling the chance of progress by continuing their talks with Sinn

He said the talks were a barrier to progress, making it impossible for Unionists to accept the SDLP as a responsible political party seeking a way forward in any future devolved government.

"In the light of recent events, those responsible members within the SDLP must realise they are being politically naive if they believe they can sway the murder policy of the IRA by talking to their apologists in Sinn Fein," he said.

"The SDLP cannot condemn terrorisation on day, and talk with them the next."

Bro. McCrea claimed the Anglo-Irish Agreement was "all but dead," and that Orangemen would continue their "undaunted opposition"

DUBLIN DUPLICTY

Dublin, he said, had never sought to keep their part of any agreement, and the Anglo-Irish Agreement was denying people their liberties as British citizens.

Calling for a more active approach to defeating the IRA, he said: "The IRA are a bunch of callous people to whom human life means absolutely nothing. Murder and mayhem are their priorities.

"Mrs. Thatcher must stop playing with people's lives. She must recognise her security policy has failed,

MP Accuses "Times" of **Falsehoods**

Upper Bann Ulster Unionist M.P., Bro. Harold McCuske has written to the editor of the London daily newspaper, "Th Times," complaining about an article which appeared in the issue of July 13.

In it the writer stated, inter alia, "On the Sunday beforeth Twelfth Portadown members of the local Lodge proclaim the continuing Protestant ascendancy in the province by march ing through the streets, including the one flanked by estate which house 6,000 working-class Catholics, 90 per cent whom are unemployed. Local Catholics respond by staying home behind closed doors or by lining the streets to jeer an sometimes throw stones."

In his letter to the "Times" editor Bro. McCusker state "In an article carried by you on 13th July, reference w made to Portadown, Co. Armagh, where I have lived for I years. For the past 15 years, I have represented it Parliament, first as the Member for Armagh and latterly the Member for Upper Bann — I know it intimately.

"The article contained the assertion that Garvaghy Road flanked by estates which house 6,000 working-class (Roma Catholics 90% of whom are unemployed.

"Both of these statistics are false and the claim that 90% a unemployed is patently absurd. In fact 20% of the residents the largest estate have recently bought their homes from 1 NI Housing Executive.

"I am surprised that your paper should carry such assertion hich in their nature and intent are much more sectarian the anything which happened on Garvaghy Road this past wee

Your more preceptive readers will have noted the sour of these falsehoods."

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Death of Former World Orange Master

It is with deep regret that we need the death of Lieut-colonel George Edwin Liddle, OBE. C.B.E., D.L., J.P. which occurred on the Twelfth of Iuly in Suffolk, England. He had been in ailing health for some time and he passed way at the residence of a

Predeceased by his two predeceased by his two presences survived by a family of five - Ernest, Ruth, Ted, Noel, and Miriam. He was

aged 86 years.
Together with the late Viscount Brookeborough he founded the Ulster Special Constabulary when the Border was being set up in the early 1920's to act in support of the regular police. The Force became popularly known as the "B" Specials, performing mad patrols. It was replaced almost 20 years ago by the Ulster Defence Regiment.

A native of Lisbellaw, he went to join the Army when he was not quite 17 and was turned down because he was under

At Easter 1919 he received a tip-offthat Lisbellaw was going to be attacked by the IRA and he helped to organise Loyalists who successfully drove off the miders.

Shortly afterwards the "B" Specials were formed with units all over Fermanagh, and in other parts of the Province.

During World War Two the Specials were amalgamated into the Ulster Home Guard and he was appointed Lieutenant-Colonel. They reverted to the USC after the war and he eventually succeeded Colonel Henry Richardson as County Commandant, completing his service in 1967, two years before the force was dis-

In an interview last year Colonel Liddle said he was sorry to see the Specials disbanded. "I think it was a splendid force for the protection of the public. We always had good relations with the Roman Catholic population," he said.

A member of the committee of Enniskillen Savings Bank he took a leading role in its development and helped to found the Ulster Farmers' Mart at Enniskillen, assisting with its management after he had retired from the USC.

He was a life-long member of the Orange Order, joining Lisbellaw LOL No. 753 on the Twelfth of July, 1917.

For some years up to the time of his death he occupied the position of Grand Master of the Co. Fermanagh Grand Orange Lodge.

Further Orange honours included his election as Grand Treasurer of the Grand Orange Lodge of Ireland and Grand Master of the Imperial Orange Council of the World.

He was elected to the latter position in Toronto, 1982.

In the Royal Black Institution he became a member of Lisbellaw R.B.P. No. 392 in early life.

In Freemasonry he had a distinguished career, having been initiated in St. John's Masonic Lodge No. 891, going on to attain high rank in various Masonic spheres.

Throughout his long and active life he was closely involved in the Ulster Unionist Party. He was honoured by being elected President of the Co. Fermanagh Unionist Association and Chairman of the Fermanagh and South Tyrone Imperial Constituency Association.

A member of the Methodist Church in Ireland he worshipped at Darling Street Methodist Church in Enniskillen.

For his public services he was awarded the OBE and CBE some years ago and made both a Justice of the Peace and a Deputy Lieutenant for Fermanagh.

Colonel Liddle had the distinction of being the last High Sheriff of Fermanagh to entertain the Judges of the Assize and the Grand Jury members and their wives at the opening of the Assizes.

AN APPRECIATION

The demise of Lieut.-Colonel George Edwin Liddle removes from this earthly scene an Ulster patriot in the fullest sense of that term.

It was the writer's privilege to have known him for wellover half a century during which time a firm and lasting friendship developed.

While still a teenager his qualities of leadership were recognised when he galvanised the Loyalists in the village of Lisbellaw and put to flight an IRA gang who had launched an attack on a then small community.

His gallantry on this and on succeeding occasions when the IRA staged further terrorist

campaigns in the Lakeland County earned him the reputation of a folk hero.

Affable, helpful, courteous, Edwin Liddle had a host of friends in many parts throughout the Orange world.

Few men have so succeeded in propagating the interests of our Institution and further enhancing its influence, both at home and overseas.

He lived through several turbulent periods in Ulster's history, fearlessly and purposefully, a veritable rock in stormy seas.

His leadership and his wise counsel will be much missed in Orange and Unionist circles, and to the members of his family sincere condolence is extended.

We salute the memory of a great and good Ulsterman who combined in his long life gifts of stature, courage, endurance and skill, grateful as we are for the example he has left behind.

Loss to Irish Orangeism

Orangeism generally, and Irish Orangeism particularly, has lost one of its best known, highly respected and much appreciated brethren in the passing of George Liddle on 12 July.

His contribution to the Orange Institution in Ireland was of such size and quality that adorning several high offices he served it magnificently.

As County Grand Master of Fermanagh, Grand Treasurer of the Grand Lodge of Ireland, he was a powerful influence for good in the Institution.

A man of deep Christian convictions who sought untiringly to advocate those principles of faith and conduct consonant with his faith, he guided those under his care with that sensitivity which is a mark of leadership at its best.

In a long life spent to the last in the service of God and his fellowman George Liddle exemplified those qualities of character and conduct which are characteristic of the truly committed follower of Jesus Christ. And his life was always interesting, even exciting, with never a dull movement. It is not my purpose here to pen a profile of Bro. Liddle — it took many minutes for the officiating minister at his funeral service to list his commitments and accomplishments since young manhood — but to express our sympathy to those bereaved by his death and to use words, always inadequate for such a purpose, to say how much we valued him as brother Orangemen.

It was a proud moment for him when he was elected Imperial Grand Master of the Grand Orange Council of the World, an office he held from 1982-1985. The distinction was the more memorable, for with one exception, the Canadian, Col. Ashmore Kidd, he was the only I.G.M. who was not a Grand Master of Ireland.

Because of his world Orangeism connection we know that the sympathy we have expressed for ourselves in Ireland to the bereaved sons, Ernest, Ted and Noel and daughters, Ruth and Miriam, is joined with that of our brethren overseas.

The largely attended funeral service, held in Enniskillen Methodist Church on 21st July, was conducted by the minister, the Rev. T. Magowan who also gave the address. The scripture readings were by Right Wor. Bro. The Right Honourable James H. Molyneaux, J.P., M.P.

In attendance were many Orangemen including the Grand Master and Imperial President, Most Wor. Bro. the Rev. W. Martin Smyth, B.D., M.P.; the Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Ireland, Right Wor. Bro. John McCrea, J.P.; Imperial Secretary, Right Wor. Bro. Walter Williams J.P.; Imperial Chaplain, Right Wor. Bro. the Rev. Canon S. E. Long, L.Th, J.P.; and Grand Chaplain Right Wor. Bro. the Right Rev. R. W. Heavener, M.A., former Bishop of Clogher.

The senior officers of Fermanagh County Lodge including Wor. Bro. Eddie Elliott, D.C.G. M., were present with several County Grand Masters and Grand Lodge officers and members.

Well represented, too, was Lisbellaw L.O.L. No. 753 which Bro. Liddle joined on the Twelfth in 1917.

The graveside ceremony was performed by the Rev. T. Magowan at which the Grand Master read from the Scriptures.

As we mourn the passing of a stalwart of our Order we express the hope that those of us who are left, and those who will join with us in the Orange Institution, will seek to emulate him in that quality of commitment he showed for the cause of Orangeism, Protestantism and Unionism in Ulster. S.E.L.

Afterwards, they paraded back to Ballymacarrett Orange Hall.

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

The Secretary of State for lorthern Ireland has one course only – to restore those constitutional freedoms under the law which in recent years had been denied to Her lajesty's subjects in this part of her realm, said Mr. Molyneaux

The unionist leader, speakagin his capacity as Sovereign Grand Master of the Imperial Grand Black Chapter of the British Commonwealth, said that the critics of the Institution chided them for remembering their past.

"If they look at our banners, they would discover that the past to which we look for inspiration is one which they themsevles cannot disown," he said.

WHAT CANNOT BE FORGOTTEN

"Which of the great events of the Old Testament would they like us to forget?"

"How many New Testament lessons could they reject without endangering modern society and even their own faith?"

He said the first resolution listed for yesterday's proceedings gave thanks to God for another great event – the Glorious Revolution.

Recently, he said, in the House of Commonsthis phrase was opposed by republican MPs who were reflecting the views of their fellow travellers.

"But," said Mr. Molyneaux, "the Loyal Address which will be presented to Her Majesty later this month, when I hope to be present, reminds us all that the Declaration of Rights presented to King William and Queen Mary vindicated and asserted the ancient right of liberty of the people."

The word Glorious, he said, is justified on other grounds.

Unlike many others it was an orderly, bloodless Revolution.

"The revolution unleashed on this Province of Ulster 20 years ago has cost 2,500 lives. Rebellion continues, and what have the originators to say for themselves?"

Grand Master of the County Armagh Grand Black Chapter to whom condolence was conveyed by Mr. Molyneaux on the death of his nephew in a motoring accident the previous day.

The resolution which he proposed expressed devotion and loyality to the Throne and Queen Elizabeth.

And it gave thanks to God as they approached the 300th anniversary of the events of 1688, 1689 and 1690, "whereby the blessings of a free Parliament and of freedom of religion were secured to all persons within this realm."

Seconding the resolution, Imperial Grand Treasurer Joseph Trueman, said the coming of King William and Queen Mary marked the beginning of democratic rule in these lands.

Twelfth Media Coverage Privatisation

Orangemen are never satisfied with the media coverage accorded the Twelfth demonstration of the Institution. It is certain that dissatisfaction will be expressed after the celebrations of 1988.

It has to be admitted that the very size of the task makes proper reportage of what goes on over the Twelfth difficult if not impossible. Much of what takes place is so similar from year to year that mere repetition has to be avoided and what is newsworthy and of viewer and listener interest is a matter of choice and selection. Because what the media people see as useful for their purposes of providing information and entertainment, and that of Orangemen is not the same, dissatisfaction to a greater or lesser degree is inevitable.

That being said it is likely that some Orangemen will be better pleased than they have been in recent years with the work of radio and television people in 1988. The pre-Twelfth conversation and interview programmes on the Institution, its history and present attitudes, were well done. And the showings of the events of the day were more perceptive than had been the case on other occasions.

It would appear that the Institution had a good public performance this year and nothing was said or done by ourselves or others to adversely affect our image. The place and purpose of Orangeism in our society, being reassessed these days, is showing the movement to be a rational and beneficial additive to life here.

The contribution of the Orange Institution is now being seen by serious students of religion and politics in Ulster as of peculiar importance for its stabilising influence on our society. It is worth noting that that conclusion is a modern recognition of what was current opinion among those who studied Protestantism and Unionism in the Ulster of other days.

The increasing interest in Orangeism with the celebrations of the "Glorious Revolution" and the concentration on the anniversaries of William III and Mary II, means that the Institution will be in the public eye in larger profile than ever. The opportunity should be taken to launch a recruiting campaign accompanied with the publication of material which will give the general public a proper understanding of the aims and aspirations of the organisation. To show Orangeism as it is, and the things for which it stands, and not as it is portrayed by unfair criticism by those whose attacks are irrational and without basis in reality.

In such a campaign "The Orange Standard" is available for use. It is the one clear voice of Orangeism in Ireland today.

The intention of the Government to privatise Short Harland and Wolff and Northern Ireland Electricity ha caused consternation among employees, trade unionists and politicians here and at Westminster. The dismal picture painted by involved and knowledgeable people of man redundancies and much reduced labour forces in each of the industries makes a depressing prospect for those immediate involved and the Ulster community at large.

Not only are these major industries in Belfast and Ulsteri their own right but their effect on the lives of many other the their employees and their families is very considerable. A members of an Institution many of whose members ar working men engaged in one or other of these industries or others with dependence on them we express our concern fo

what is being projected.

We underline the point made by others that a depresse economy such as ours must not be treated on the same footing as other parts of the United Kingdom where conditions at very much better and dependence on a few industries very much less. Because the subsidisation of industry for social and political reasons is common practice everywhere we d not believe that the profit motive should be the deciding factor in decisions which can have a devastating effect on whole community and Province.

In the case of the profitable N.LE. the threat it not less fro privatisation, for the making of greater profits for investo often means that costs are cut to the loss of employment at the lowering of standards for working people. The matteris such crucial importance to the future wellbeing of the count that we hope the Government will change its mind and acce the reality of things here by abandoning a policy which unsuitable for us whatever merit it has in the rest of the Unit Kingdom.

Celebrating 1688

The programme "The Glorious Revolution," BBC 2 and Radio 4, 20 July, made for very good viewing and listening as her Majesty the Queen with members of both the British and Dutch Royal Families joined the Parliamentary celebrations at Westminster Hall.

The speeches from the Lord Chancellor, the Speaker of the House of Commons and the Queen were together a fine tribute to the Glorious Revolution and what it meant in replacing autocratic rule with parliamentary government. Alluding to the anniversary of the Glorious Revolution, he said it had been a 'glorious' revolution because it had established civil and religious liberty for all.

He said that young and old, the Unionist people, were opposed to the Anglo-Irish Agreement, as had been adequately demonstrated since it was signed. The Agreement had failed to bring the promised better security conditions and Unionists were demanding proper steps, not cosmetic measures, to defeat the terrorists and safeguard the lives of ordinary people and members of the security forces.



The family of three, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hanna and their young son David had one thing in common with Secretary of State Tom King — they were all residents of the village of Hillsborough. Yet when Mr. King was asked by reporters on Monday July 25, two days after that horrific tragedy, in which the three were victims of an IRA bomb explosion, if he had any comment to make he replied on television that he had none! One was that when the question was asked at Stormont Castle Mr. King was clearly in no mood to reply other than with a straight "No." He realised more than

One doubts this, and wonders just where the funds came from which enabled the 'patriots" to plant a massive bomb which ended the lives of the three members of the Hanna family down at Killeen. And was Mr. James Mallon, the SDLP member of Parliament for Newry and Armagh not a little off course when he questioned why with such massive security in the Newry area that the planting of that bomb was not detected in advance by the security forces. Mr. Mallon must be aware that some of the most daring deeds have been carried out in exactly similar circumstances. Did not the British airmen captured in World War II escape in a wooden horse, and by other devious means? And why did a High Court Judge, knowing the fate of Lord Justice Sir Maurice Gibson and his wife, Lady Cecily, also at Killeen, use that same route, even though guarded by police on both sides of the Border. Many questions remain to be

answered.

MP's And NI Security

Two contrasting statements

were made on July 26. One was by the SDLP leader Mr. John Hume, M.P., who made clear that despite Unionist opposition, and discontent within some sections of his own Party, he is to continue his talks with the Sinn Fein leader, Gerry Adams, M.P. Mr. Hume has persisted in this futile exercise, knowing that Adams has insisted time after time with wearisome monotony that the IRA will continue their campaign, "their struggle" as he blandly puts it, until the British withdraw from Northern Ireland. Either Adams or Hume will give way eventually on this assertion and the odds are that it will be Adams who will have the last word. Mr. Hume says that he will persist in his endeavours to bring about an end to the murdering and destruction, and everyone who has the welfare of this community at heart would wish him well, but the prospects of this happening have been so frequently dashed that we despair. And on the same day Northern Ireland's new Minister, Mr. Ian Stewart, who will take over responsibility for security in Ulster, replacing the politically ascetic Sir John Stanley, announces, even before coming to take up his post, that he will not be introducing any new security measures. Obviously he has his mind made up not to upset the present situation whereby no major initiative to end 20 years of murder and destruction will be initiated. What a hopeless situation! No wonder the IRA are as one assumes they are, gleefully awaiting Mr. Stewart's stewardship of security in our hard-pressed Province.

Cardinal Points in Armagh

But if Mr. King is snubbed by every Unionist Council in the Province he was assured of a warm and friendly welcome on the mat at the home of Cardinal Tom Fee in Armagh about that same time. He was there as the guest of the Cardinal and once again Mr. King remains silent on the topics which were discussed round the fireplace in the Primatial city. Could we even believe that the question of the new programme for education in the Province did not find a niche in the chat which took place, or even a slight reference

to November next when the Anglo-Irish "Agreement" is due not for revision but "review." Make no mistake every effort will be made, if not already planned, to prevent the people of Northern Ireland and their public representatives having any input three months hence. Everything will be made certain that Unionism will have no say in the secret proceedings whether they be held at Stormont, Maryfield or Leinster House in Dublin. King will unfailingly toe the Dublin line, and that will be that. Dublin must not be

And that will be that. And what the outcome will be will surely be in line with Roman Catholic philosophy. The hidden hand of the papacy will be there to ensure that Roman susceptibilities are not upset. The Roman and Nationalist sectors have enjoyed so much success in the public sphere that they must surely be feeling, in the words of a song sung a few decades ago "Everything's going my way." No wonder that the nationalist lamb is now showing what was suspected long ago, the bare teeth of a tiger.

Bias Against Protestants

Unionists and Lovalists generally have experienced so much discrimination in the past few years that it is very encouraging to find that the ability to fight back and to counter worldwide allegations is beginning to surface. One, therefore, welcomes the establishment of The Northern Ireland Anti-Discrimination Association whose aim is to operate reverse discrimination wherever it is apparent. In a statement the Association points out that the monitoring of work forces is "probably the most divisive action of all." The group represents a broad

spectrum of Loyalist opinion, including the Orange Institution, the Apprentice Boys of Derry, Ulster Unionists, DUP, and the Independent Orange Order. There is no doubt that the "Fair" Employment Agency in its operation has done more than anything else to heighten tension in the workplace not iust because of its existence but because of what has been stated on more than one occasion - that it has done little to meet and satisfy the grievances of the Protestant sector when complaints have been put to them. We have had

instances reported to us of what were once regarded as predominately Protestant offices reflecting the local Protestant population ratio, are peopled largely by Roman Catholics. This has been a quiet revolution with little or no Protestant opposition. Now the situation

is to be put under closer and more public scrutiny, and the issue has been expressed in documentary form to the Department of the Environment and the "Fair" Employment Agency. Loyalists have got up off their knees and are making their voices heard Excellent!

recognition that they deserve, either in employment or privileges. They, despite their British outlook, are no less loyal residents of the Republic. They are in every respect excellent citizens, often displaying citizenship of a quality far exceeding their numbers or opportunities. How many Protestants, for instance, are employed in State bodies throughout those 26 Counties, and how often have they made protests against certain aspects of life there which have a direct link with religious influence of the majority community? The Mother and Child controversy of 1951 is recalled. Then the young Government Minister, Dr. Noel Browne, was ticked off by Sean MacBride that it "was, of course, impossible for

us (the Government) to ignore the views of the Heirarchy," adding that as "Catholics" they were "not prepared to accept the responsibility of disregarding their views." That same attitude remains, though in

more recent times a new spirit of independence is emerging, and the Heirarchy while still wishing to impose its trad-

itional iron will is beginning to realise that Irish glasnost is about to make its voice felt where heretofore it was muted or silenced with the belt of a crosier.

Onward March of a Revived 'Rome's Role in

In every respect, the Twelfth of July, 1988, must be voted a huge success, and Grand Lodge and County officers have every reason to feel extremely satisfied as they reflect on a demonstration which earned the Orange Order admiration and respect, as well as interest from people who have only a peripheral knowledge of the Order and its aims and objectives.

HUGE, COLOURFUL

It was huge and colourful, with all the parades reporting increased turnouts, the deportment and discipline being of a high standard.

The most satisfying aspect to all was the fact that such a magnificent parade took place against an entirely peaceful background.

Gone were the street disturbances and distressing scenes which had spoiled several demonstrations, especially those at Portadown, during the 1985 and 1986 rallies, and in their place, was a relaxed and highly enjoyable demonstration of loyalty.

Thoughts on what was happening at Portadown predominated the thinking at most other rallies on the Twelfth, but thankfully everything passed off in that town in a quiet and orderly fashion, with huge crowds enjoying the spectacle once again of lodges and bands, and with an absence of top security measures.

The success of the Portadown demonstration reflected much credit on the Orange and Black Institution in that town, and their officers, who patiently and positively arrived at decisions which overcame any predicted difficulties.

The police and army played their part, and the realistic solution arrived at by all concerned over the routes of the pre-Twelfth church parade to Drumcree did a lot to defuse any potential for trouble on July 12 and 13 in Portadown, and set the pattern for a peaceful marching season in that stronghold of loyalism and Orangeism.

END OF TURMOIL PROSPECT

Now there is a real prospect that the turmoil and the anger of the past three years in Portadown will disappear, and that future demonstrations there will follow the same peaceful tradition of all the other Twelfth rallies held from shortly after the formation of the first Orange lodges in 1795

Order

until 1985, when decisions outside the control of the Orange Institution were arrived at, and the re-routing of marches going back nearly 200 years caused such trouble.

Portadown, of course, was only one aspect of the Twelfth of July, 1988, and if the success of that town's demonstration gave rise to the greatest delight the same could be said of all the other rallies in the Province.

Belfast County was buoyant and rightly so over the size and the deportment of the biggest demonstration held in the Province. Redevelopment and the troubles have caused bigger problems to Belfast than any other Orange County in Ulster, and no attempt was made to minimise the difficulties faced by the loss of many members who had moved outside the city boundaries.

However, there has been a tremendous lot of hard work on the part of District and private lodges in the 10 Belfast Districts over the past number of years, and there are distinct signs of an upward trend in numbers once again in the city.

With more housing taking place in Protestant areas of Belfast, many members have been moving back into the city, and Lodges which had been struggling in some areas, have been receiving a steady flow of

Some city Districts are doing extremely well — Ballymacarrett and Sandy Row are examples — and others are finding the going more tough, especially in North Belfast, but the overall impression of this year's Twelfth in Belfast was that it was the most successful for a decade, and reflected the resurgence of interest in the

OUTSTANDING SHOW IN PORTADOWN

Portadown has already been mentioned and taking the County Armagh demonstration as a whole, it was outstanding. The second largest single rally, after Belfast, it showed Orangeism in its birthplace to be in a fine state. There were some really big Districts on parade, and while Portadown is still the largest, the gap is being closed by Lurgan, Loughgall, Tandragee, Markethill, and others, while border districts like Bessbrook and Keady are

really flourishing.

If Belfast has declined numerically in the past decade, through movement of population, there are signs that other Districts on the periphery of the city are now gaining from the flow of new members into their areas.

Lisburn is an example, and this year's rally in that town was a mammoth affair, with some 5,000 brethren taking part. There was a special solemnity about the Lisburn rally, as thoughts of most people went back to the slaughter of six young offduty soldiers recently by the IRA, following a fun run in the town.

The same feeling was uppermost at the Belfast rally, as the city brethren remembered two young brethren serving in the Ulster Defence Regiment who were foully murdered in a bomb blast at Royal Avenue.

Other districts, including Carrickfergus, Antrim, Newtownards, Newtownabbey and Bangor are now benefitting from the inflow of former Belfast brethren into their areas, and more and more are answering the appeal of Grand Lodge officers to join and become identified with Orangeism in the new areas to which they have moved.

ANTRIM STRENGTH

Antrim is now the strongest county numerically in Orangeism, and this is due to a large extent to the movement from Belfast. But Down, Tyrone and Londonderry Orange counties are also flourishing, while the rallies in Fermanagh showed just how well the brethren of that frontier county have held firm to the cause.

This year's Twelfth was a fitting start to celebrations which will last two years, recalling the Glorious Revolution, and reaching their peak two years hence with the 300th anniversary of the Battle of the Boyne.

Clearly, the atmosphere created by the Anglo-Irish Agreement is one in which Orangeism has thrived, and the response by many people shows that they place great faith in Orangeism's ability to maintain its traditional role of protecting the interests of the Protestant people of Ulster.

Bro. John McCrea, Belfast Grand Master, spoke for all leaders of the Order when he said after the demonstration that it was especially gratifying to see so many recruits, including a high proportion of young people. He also confirmed that a significant proportion of the larger numbers who took part in this year's marches were lapsed or dormant members returned

IRA Campaign'

The Rev. Ian Paisley M.P. claimed that a "sinister conspiracy" by Rome in the IRA campaign was going largely unchallenged.

He was addressing the Independent Orange Order demonstration at Ballycastle, when he said it was strange that Rome could quickly excommunicate Archbishop Lefebvre, but found "insurmountable obstacles" in doing the same to IRA murderers.

CRUFIXES FOR TERRORISTS

The DUP leader said the Pope had sent "golden crucifixes" to IRA men who died on hunger strike, while it was well known that the Roman Catholic Church had set up the talks between the SDLP and Sinn Fein.

Mr. Paisley claimed the 'power of the Papacy in European politics" was seen in the President of the European Parliament, Lord Plumb, welcoming the Pope when he visits it in October.

"All that our great wars were fought for, to resist domination of our country by Europe, is being surrendered without a shot being fired," he said.

Mr. Paisley said the

Government was "playing down" the true significence of the current anniversaries such as the Landing of the Prince of Orange and the beginning of the Williamite Revolution.

He believed there was a regular connection of national misfortune with the introduction of "Popish influence." The lesson of history had not been learnt, and the nation today was in "sad decline," spiritually, morally and politically.

Mr. Paisley attacked the ecumenical movement, saying that they had abolished the British Council of Churches to form with Rome a new church council, in which Cardinals Hume and O'Fiaich would be foundation members, along with the Church of Ireland, the Irish Presbyterian and Methodist Churches.



The Ulster Society for the promotion of Ulster and British Heritage and Culture is currently compiling information on the subject: "Everyday Life in Northern Ireland During The Second World War, 1939-45"

Due to the minimal amount of literature available on the subject, says a submitted statement "we feel the significant role of Northern Ireland in the war has been overlooked, and we intend to correct this oversight, by interviewing members of the public whose information will culminate in a published work on the subject.

THATCHER "PLEDGES"

"Examining the events of this year I bring you back to Friday, 14th May last. 
